The 6 Most Basic Comma Rules

1. Use a comma when there is a list.

Example: Today I ate hot peppers, tacos, and pizza.

2. Use commas within <u>compound sentences</u>. (Sentences in which two complete thoughts are joined by and, but, yet, so, for, or, nor.)

Example: I had a lot of homework to do, so I locked myself in my room until it was finished.

3. Always use commas with <u>complex sentences</u> in which the dependent clause is at the beginning.

Example: Although I asked you not to interfere, I see that you couldn't resist.

4. Use a comma in introductory phrases like by the way, in order to, etc.

Example: In order to be successful in a paper, one must use commas correctly.

5. Use commas with <u>transition words</u> such as first, next, but, however, etc.

Example: Next, we went to the baseball game.

I want to go; however, I have homework to do first.

6. Use a comma when introducing a quote.

Example: Ben Stein said, "Metaphors be with you."
