# "Colonel Drake And His Legacy" Lecture To Be Presented On Thursday



Dr. William R. Brice, author of the soon-to-be published biography, *Myth, Legend, Reality: Edwin L. Drake and the Early Oil Industry*, will be the guest speaker at the fifth annual lecture of the Barbara Morgan Harvey Center for the Study of Oil Heritage at Clarion University-Venango Campus. His topic will be "Colonel Edwin Drake and His

Legacy."

It was one hundred and fifty years ago, on the banks of Oil Creek, that an unemployed, former railroad conductor - without any formal training - started a revolution that changed the world. Although many have heard of the Drake Well, not so well known is the story of how he came to be there and the difficulties he faced. The celebration of his discovery is also a celebration of the triumph of the human spirit over adversity – tempered with great personal tragedy.

The program, which is free and open to the public, will be held on Thursday, October 22<sup>nd</sup> in the Robert W. Rhoades Center auditorium on The Venango Campus at 7 p.m. A dessert reception will follow the program.

The research collection of the Barbara Morgan Harvey Center for the Study of Oil Heritage is located in the Charles L. Suhr Library and is available for use.

materials, as well as additional links, is provided there.


## Computer Tip: See The Big Picture!

If you would like to see more web page and less web browser toolbars, here is a little trick you might like.

Hitting the **F11** key will put you into "full screen" mode. Hitting the **F11** again takes you back to normal mode. This works in both Internet Explorer and Firefox.

One complaint people tend to have with full screen mode is that you do not have the address or menu bar. With Internet Explorer, you can actually have your digital cake and eat it too!

Just **right-click** a blank area of the toolbar. A menu will pop up that lets you add your address bar, menu bar, and any other Explorer bars you feel the need to have.



Since it is in full screen mode, you will not be able to squeeze too many of these extra little bars in, but at least you can get the essentials.
