Comparative Business Stats - Electronic Access



Market Share Reporter presents comparative business statistics in a clear, straightforward manner, providing a detailed overview of international companies, products, and services. It includes more than 2,000 entries on a wide range of topics, from global positioning systems to laboratory equipment.

Entries typically include:

- Description (e.g., "Best Selling Digital Music Genres")
- Summary of the size of the market
- Breakdown of market share by percentage
- Complete source citation
- Subject categories
- SIC and NAICS code(s).

Historical data allows researchers to quickly track market trends over time, providing invaluable insight into virtually any industry.

Computer Tip: Automatically Select All Connected Cells

Whether it is for the purpose of setting a print area or changing the formula of a sheet, most users occasionally have a need to quickly select all adjacent cells. This can be done with three keys.

- Click any cell within the range of cells to be selected.
- 2. Hold down the **CTRL** key while depressing the **Shift**
