Library Tip: ID Card




Don't forget to bring your Clarion University ID Card with you when you visit the library. Your card enables you to check materials out from the library, borrow a wireless notebook computer, and print from the computer labs when you have Eagle Dollars on your card.

Computer Tip: 32- or 64-bit?

It's good to know what kind of operating system (OS) you have on your computer, that way you'll be able to download the appropriate kinds of drivers and programs that work best with your configuration. So, how about a tip within a tip for this one? Not only are you going to find out which type of operating system you currently have, but we'll even show

you a quick way to get there!

For Windows XP users – Hold the Windows Key, and then press the Pause Key, which is located two keys to the right of the Print Screen key. Voila! You are then looking at the system properties! This window shows all of the basic info about your computer like how much RAM you have as well as what OS you're running. If it doesn't specifically say Windows XP x64 Edition, then you're running a 32 bit operating system.



For Windows Vista and 7 users – Same drill: press and hold the **Windows Key**, then hit the **Pause Key**. Up comes the system properties window and you'll notice a specific field that says "System Type", which has your OS type listed after it.

TED (Technology Entertainment and Design) is a global set of conferences owned by the private non-profit Sapling Foundation, formed to disseminate "ideas worth spreading."


TED was founded in 1984 as a one-off event and the conference was held annually

from 1990 in Monterey, California. TED's early emphasis was largely technology and design, consistent with a Silicon Valley center of gravity. The events are now held in Long Beach and Palm Springs in the U.S. as well as in Europe and Asia, offering live streaming of the talks. They address an increasingly wide range of topics within the research and practice of science and culture.

The speakers are given a maximum of 18 minutes to present their ideas in the most innovative and engaging ways they can. Past presenters include <u>Bill Clinton</u>, <u>Jane Goodall</u>, <u>Malcolm Gladwell</u>, <u>Al Gore</u>, <u>Gordon Brown</u>, <u>Richard Dawkins</u>, <u>Bill Gates</u>, educator <u>Salman Khan</u>, Google founders <u>Larry Page</u> and <u>Sergey Brin</u>, and many Nobel Prize winners
