iPads At The Libraries!



Could using an iPad help with one of your class assignments? Would you just like to try out an iPad for a day? Carlson Library now has iPads that students can borrow and, soon, Suhr Library will have them too! Check them out one day and they are due back an hour before closing the next day.

Each iPad is circulated with:

- Carrying case
- USB power cord and adapter
- Protective cover
- Pre-loaded basic apps.
- If you want to load additional apps, you can do so through the iTunes App Store (each user sets up his or her own account).

To be useful, an iPad must be within range of an open or accessible wireless network, so we have included a handy "how-to" card inside the case.

When you return the iPad to the Circulation Desk, all of your activity, data, photos, music, and apps are wiped from the device and are no longer accessible. Of course, apps (but *no app data*) are stored on your iTunes account so you can download them again the next time you use an iPad.

Once each semester iPad borrowers are asked to read and sign a borrowing agreement that outlines what you need to know about borrowing an iPad. For instance:

- You can keep it for a day
- Late fees are \$25 per day
- Fees for damaged equipment may be assessed on an individual basis
- Lost iPads will cost you \$600

Library Tip: Easels




Do you need an easel for a special presentation or display?

by Mark Adams


What happens when an unadventurous adventure writer tries to re-create the original expedition to Machu Picchu?

Computer Tip: Save Your Data By Protecting Your USB Drive



Have you ever thought about just how much information you have stored on a USB Drive? If you lost it or if it were damaged, how hard would it be to redo all the work you have stored there? Here are some suggestions for you to consider:

- Change the name of a USB drive to your name and/or phone number. You might get it returned more quickly and easily.
- Create a text document with your complete contact information. Name it something like:

~~If Found, Please Return To Joe College

The double tilde (~~) at the beginning of the document name ensures that it is the very first item viewable when the USB drive is opened or "explored."

- Always backup your flash drive data on a computer!
- Using the "Eject" feature is always a good idea. If you pull a USB drive from the computer while a read or write operation is in progress, the entire drive will become corrupted (and unusable).
