## 141,000+ E-Books



Did you know that Clarion University Libraries provide access to more than 141,000 electronic books?

Titles are available in almost all subject areas and more are being added monthly. Most can be

accessed through the Discovery Search Box at the University Libraries Website, or through PILOT, the online catalog of library book and media holdings.

Major collections of electronic books may also be accessed through EBSCO, ebrary, and Safari Technology & Business Books found under the E-Book Collections link at the library Web site. In addition to access through the Discovery Search box or PILOT, reference sources may also be located directly through Credo Reference, Gale Virtual Reference Library, and the Oxford Digital Reference Shelf listed under the E-Book Collections link.

Besides the books that we purchase to meet specific course and research needs, we provide links to Internet sites that provide free access to thousands of digitized books. These include DigitalBookIndex, Internet Archives Million Book Project, Project Gutenberg and others. Of course Google Books and Google Scholar are already used by many of you.

### Did you know:

- Not all publishers will sell e-books to libraries
- Libraries can't purchase e-books from Amazon
- Some publishers withhold the availability of e-books until 3-6 months after the print edition is published
- Some publishers charge libraries 3-6 times the cost of a print edition
- E-books are licensed and most can only be used by one person at a

Carlson Library accepts Eagle Dollars to pay for library fines and lost books. Just let the staff person on duty at the Carlson Library Circulation Desk know that you want


to take care of your obligation with Eagle Dollars and present your ID card. They will take care of the rest.

## Cranial Candy: Did You Know?



The Terms of Service is a set of rules an individual or organization must abide by in order to use a service.

A Terms of Service agreement is legally binding (except in cases where the individual is below a certain age and does not have parental consent or the terms of service violates local, state, or federal laws) and generally covers various aspects of the user's interaction with the service, such as how the user's data will be used, how the user can use the

service (e.g. you can send personal email but you can't send commercial email), and so on.

Terms of Service agreements are widely criticized as being arcane and difficult to read; so much so that it is rare for end users to actually read them and to instead blindly accept the terms.

## **Computer Tip: Sticky Situation**



You've spilled soda (or, here in Western Pennsylvania ... "Pop") on your laptop's keyboard. What do you do now?

Please sit down. The prognosis is not good. I'm sure your computer led a full and active life until this happened.

If this were a desktop keyboard, you could run out and buy another one. Or if you had time - and weren't intimidated by the idea of taking apart a keyboard - you could attempt to clean it.

A laptop is a different story. You've got a sticky mess gumming up the works and there's no way to clean it without disassembling your computer. If your computer is still under a warranty, the spill likely invalidates that warranty. Some premium plans do offer spill coverage, so if you have a warranty or insurance, make sure to check.

Same brave, tech-savvy souls have disassembled their laptops and cleaned them successfully. But this is a pretty complicated process and isn't suggested for the novice. You might take the laptop to a computer repair shop with a good reputation to see what they can do... but be warned: This could be expensive.

Situations like this are why it's important to regularly back up your important files to an external drive or a cloud service. If at all possible, get your files off your laptop before sending it out for repair. Hopefully the soda mess did not get to your hard drive so that if the computer is not salvageable, you can transfer its contents to your next computer.

Technology has become such a part of our everyday life that we often eat or drink with it at our fingertips and forget that it can be pretty fragile. Keep liquids away from computers. If you must have food or drink near a computer, at least use cups with lids to reduce the chance of spillage. This is one of those cases where an ounce of prevention really is worth a pound of cure.
