Last August Governor Tom Wolf established an Executive Order to establish a Commission on LGBTQ Affairs. Its goal is to advise the Governor and state agencies regarding policies, programs, and legislation that impact LGBTQ communities and to serve as a resourceful intermediary between LGBTQ communities and state government. It is composed of appointed commissioners from across the Commonwealth, each acting as a representative and advocate for LGBTQ communities.

<u>Sex:</u>: refers to the biological and physiological characteristics that define men (males) and women (females).

Gender: refers to the socially constructed roles, behaviors, activities, and attributes that society considers appropriate for men (masculine) and women (feminine).

Gender Identity: is the internal sense of gender which is not visible to others. One's gender identity may or may not align with one's assigned sex at

Sexual Orientation:

refers to whom one is sexually attracted. Gender identity and sexual orientation may affect one another but they are not the same.

Transgender: is an umbrella term for people whose gender identity or expression does not match the gender they were assigned at birth.

Cisgender (Cis): is someone whose gender identity matched the gender assigned at birth.
