Business Casual Attire

Some organizations permit employees to wear business casual attire on the job. However, they still expect employees to project a professional image to customers, clientele, and others with whom they interact.

Because all casual clothing is not suitable for the office or the classroom, these guidelines provide information about what is generally considered acceptable or not acceptable as **business casual attire**. Neither list is all-inclusive so you need to apply a certain amount of judgment in your clothing choices. If you have a question about acceptable attire in your work place, consult with your supervisor or the human resources office.
